COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is intended for students who wish to spend three weeks in Italy, in Genoa, while learning Italian in a full immersion situation – four credit course. It does not require any previous knowledge of Italian. The course is taught entirely in Italian to help the student absorb the pattern of the Italian language. The students will cover the same linguistic objectives as on a spring or fall semester

<u>Grammar topics</u> covered: articles; singular and plural forms of nouns and adjectives; first, second and third conjugations of regular and irregular verbs; the present tense, the past tenses (passato prossimo, imperfetto), future and progressive tense); direct and indirect object pronouns; ne e ci, si impersonale, partitive, adverbs.

The course will also introduce students to aspects of <u>Italian life and culture</u>, including the geography, school system, the Italian city, Italian geography, houses, everyday life in Italy, food shopping, sports, food, holidays, etc.

By the end of the term, students should be able to converse in Italian on a variety of topics that reflect real-life situations, write short, original compositions about everyday life, to keep a journal. Subject areas and situations will include: addressing different people, expressing likes ad dislikes, describing people and things, doing errands, going shopping for food, going to the restaurant, the cafe. The course will also introduce students to some aspects of Italian life and culture, including shopping in Italy, the Italian family, sports in Italy, the ritual of the cafe, daily activities. The cultural lessons will include Italian history history, art history with a focus on Genoa/Liguria, opera, Italian politics. The excursions will include: a waking tour of Genoa with visit to main monuments and churches, a visit to Camogli, Portofino, a night at the opera or concert, a day trip to the 5 Terre.

Syllabus

- 1. In this winter semester, we will cover the first 6 chapter of <u>Parliamo Itali!</u>.
- 2. Frequent quizzes, generally after each lesson of the text, will be given at the discretion of the instructor. There will be <u>two tests</u> (tentatively scheduled for on January 12 and 16) and a <u>two-hour</u> final exam for the 21 of January.
- 3. Students are expected to come to class having studied the grammar assigned and being well prepared to do the oral work. Class lessons will be based on drills, conversation, reading, skits and homework exercises. Students will write an entrance a day on their journal.
- 4. Please note that this is a PARTICIPATION COURSE. Attendance is expected at all three weekly sessions, Monday through Thurday from 9:00am to 4:00pm. And from 9:00 to 1:00 on Friday. Students will be expected to attend all scheduled cultural events.
- 5. The final grade will be based on the student's overall level of accomplishment by the end of the course as determined by the following:
